Arrangements Announced for Second Annual Cruise in South

Arrangements for the second annual New Orleans States tropical

This year many requests were received to repeat the cruise and to revisit the same ports as were touched last year.

The Contessa again has been selected as the Vaccaro Line ship on which the cruise will be taken. Every stateroom is an outside room, well ventilated and charmingly appointed. The lounge, the dining salon and the cabins are equipped with fresh air ducts. Among the wide range of amusements and recreation facilities are: Shufleboard, swimming, tennis, golf and numerous other deck games. The added entertainment for the States' cruise will include a masquerade ball, captain's dinner or formal dance. The steamer, which was especially constructed for tropical cruising, will be used as a hotel during the entire cruise, which will make unnecessary the expense of hotel lodging while ashore.

The Contessa will sail from New Orleans Wednesday, August 1. Less than two days later it will arrive in Havana, whose chief charm is the mellow blending of the medieval and the modern, the intermingting of old traditions and youthful spirit.

After the thrill of Havana and the three tranquil days on the sapphire sea to Cristobal, the cruise members will disembark at the Panama canal. The entire day and a half is spent there to see everything of interest. First the canale where great ocean vessels are lifted from sea level to the canal level through the three steps of Gatun locks. Then across the Isthmus to the Pacific side, if desired, to Balboa, Ancon and old Panama City.

Puerto Cabezas, Nicaragua, a typical banana port, is the next port of call. One day is spent there, where a native dance will be given for the benefit of the cruise passengers.

Next will come the stop at La Ceiba, Honduras, where the Foreign Club will entertain in honor of the members of the States cruise.

Twelve days after sailing the Contessa will return to New Orleans.
