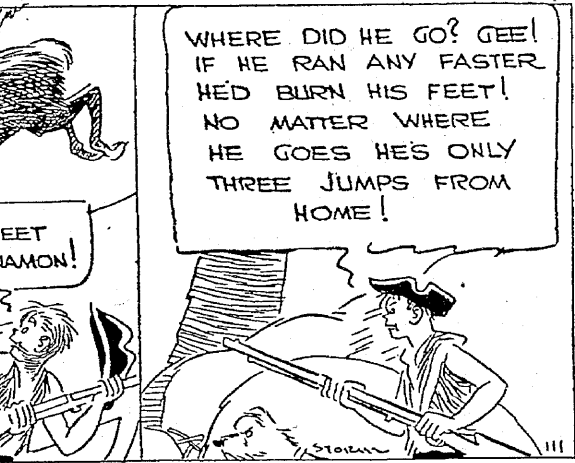

**Woman Earning Nearly \$100,000 Yearly Honored**

Rise from Poverty to Record Salary in 15 Years Is Revealed

 New York, Feb. 22.—A woman who in fifteen years rose from poverty to "the highest salary-paid woman in the world" was honored by her business associates last night.

Mrs. Blanche H. Green of Yonkers, vice-president and general sales manager of the Berger Brothers Company of New Haven, Conn., was given a dinner by the New York office of the company in honor of her fifteenth anniversary with the firm, and the story of her early struggle to support an invalid husband and a daughter and her rise to a position paying nearly \$100,000 a year was told.

Born in Virginia, she married early. Six years after the wedding her husband was thrown from a horse and crippled for life. With no business training, she took a position as saleswoman for the Berger company, corset manufacturers, and at the end of her first year she broke all sales records.

She was called in and offered the job of organizing a nationwide sales force, and since has built up an organization of 4500 salespeople, with offices in every city of any size in the United States. Ten months of every year she spends traveling.

Immigration Law Change Need Cited at Jewish Congress

 Washington, Feb. 22.—Modification of the immigration laws of the United States in order that the families

of those immigrants already in this country may be permitted to join them was urged before the American Jewish Congress today by Representative Dickstein, Democrat, of New York.

At the session yesterday a general discussion of the Rumanian situation was held. Solomon Sufin, chairman of the committee on resolutions of the congress, stated that the purpose of the Rumanian government in its excesses against Jews was "to defeat and deprive one million Jewish citizens of their equal political rights provided in the Constitution" of Rumania.

Facing white slavery charges here more than a year ago, the couple met first in Mexico, secured divorce annulling their former marriages and were themselves married. Returning to the United States, they married again.
